City Manager Judy Richter reflects back on four-years-plus of Toledo leadership

"So, what did you do during the 2020 Covid Pandemic, Grammy?" Judy Richter's answer will be, "I took over the management of a small city on the Oregon Coast and developed policies and standards of operation that protected my staff and residents, and kept us moving forward." Or similar words, same message!

After a career in accounting, with a degree in Accounting and Business Administration, Judy left the City of Yachats, where she had been in charge of all-things-financial, and accepted the position of Financial Director for City of Toledo in 2019. A year later, after an unsuccessful national search for a manager who could recognize and honor the priorities of our small community, and run a tight fiscal ship, the Toledo Council recognized that they had the best candidate sitting in City Hall, and quickly appointed Judy as City Manager. And, of course, her new leadership job started right when Covid hit!

Judy takes great pride in the wonderful team she has guided and shaped, carefully matching staff's abilities and talents to the sections of their department where they could shine and improve City services. During Covid, when other cities and counties shuttered their doors and provided limited services by email and phone calls, the team at City of Toledo kept right on going – with safety precautions, of course.

Judy saw that the city completed vital infrastructure work that reduced inflow and infiltration, so that the sewer system could function more efficiently, saving wear and tear on pipes and pumps. They replaced waterlines, paved streets, and improved playgrounds. She headed the establishment of the Urban Renewal Agency, which broadens the tax base and allows for more improvements, including the remodeling of a new public safety building.

City of Toledo is a better place for having been served by Judy Richter, and we wish her well in her retirement.

The Public Works crew has re-built "Rock Park" on Main Street, to make it actually usable and much more attractive. It also has three mural stands with interchangeable 4x4 murals that can be changed out anytime the Arts Committee decides to do so. The flower baskets along both Main Street and the Port have been placed again this year. Construction on Arcadia Park restrooms begins in June, followed by work on the tennis court fence replacement and walking path. Fire Explorers Program

Toledo Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department is home to Boy Scouts of America, Fire Explorer Post 5030. This is a program where youth ages 14-21 can come and gain some experience in the fire and medical services careers. This post

currently meets every other Wednesday from 6:00-8:00pm, with drills and training on alternative weeks. This is a combination of classroom and hands-on training in fire, rescue and emergency medical services topics.

Your youth also has the ability to be elected by their peers for a youth leadership role, including president, vice president, secretary, treasurer and sergeant-at-arms. Youth in these roles meet on the other Wednesdays of the month to plan drills, fundraising ideas and envisioning where they would like the program to go.

There are adult advisors who are currently members of either the fire or EMS services, to lead them along the way, but overall, the program is youth-led.
