FROM MAYOR ROD CROSS

This month's message is about two very important topics: infrastructure and community. Most of you that have known me for years know that I am committed to both of those items here in the city of Toledo.

Infrastructure isn't "sexy", but it is necessary for the upkeep of civilization. I believe that keeping up with water, sewer, building and street needs, before they fail, is a vital part of my job as your mayor.

Our Ammon Road water tank is in need of replacement. It is a one-million-gallon tank that is vital not only for the Sturdevant Road area, but also to allow us to balance water flows throughout the city. Our ability to store water has never been more necessary than it is today. As recently as two years ago, we were the only community not to go into water curtailment – partly because of our storage capacity.

Toledo is growing, and will continue to grow. The need to replace this tank will only become more evident as growth occurs. To meet the costs of replacement, your city government is considering a General Obligation Bond for the 2023 election. This bond would replace the expiring bond for the fire station. The effect on property taxes would be minimal, and possibly could show a decrease, when the current bond is retired.

On another note - Community comes in all ages, and I want to invite everyone to come up to the Toledo Junior/ Senior High School for the 100-Year Celebration of Toledo Schools, on Thursday, May 4, 2023 with an open house beginning at 5:30pm.



The Public Works crew has been wrapping up the new play structure at Memorial Park and parents and toddlers are really enjoying it! It is good to see children outside playing again.



The SET softball and baseball groups are working hard to get the fields usable after all the rainfall. Water pumps have been installed to drain the field and get it ready for game day.

The new bicycle racks have been installed at all the bus stops and along Main Street. The surface of Rock Park to Main Street is scheduled for a make-over soon, as well. The existing rock work has become quite unstable and will be removed and replaced with very attractive block.

Work continues to reduce the Infiltration of ground water into the sewer system; sewer lines are being lined and manholes rebuilt. Infrastructure maintenance for the City is very expensive and needs to be addressed with continuous rehab projects every year.
