

Snow Season is right around the corner

Last year was a doozy, there were a few snow events that provided Toledo with more than an average dusting. Power was knocked out in some areas of town, including our Public Works facilities. Roads were either impassable due to fallen trees and limbs or snow hadn't been cleared. Thanks to one of Toledo's citizens, Public Works was able to clear some of these routes faster with their help.

Toledo Public Works has established snow routes that are prioritized and may be viewed on the City of Toledo webpage (www.cityoftoledo.org). Public Works has one plow truck and a spreader for salt. In the event of a snow event, Public Works will adhere to the snow/sanding routes. Public works will not clear sidewalks that are not in front of Toledo public facilities.

IMPORTANT UPCOMING COUNCIL BUSINESS

The City Council will be introducing a new ordinance on livability. This important piece of local legislation will afford the City an avenue to address blighted properties and assist renters in working with neglected issues from their landlords. TOLEDO TOWN HALL

The Toledo City Council hosted a Town Hall last month for the public at the Toledo Fire Department, updating citizens on key city issues and projects taking place within our community. There was a good turnout, with dinner, refreshments and introductions all around. We saw new faces, not just from the community but new City Councilors too! Council members talked about their adopted goals which provide financial guidance for staff as they work to complete projects like the new bathrooms at Arcadia Park. Art Toledo was present and summarized all their work and progress the group has made in the last year. This included a community mural and a mural art walk for teens, along with the continued growth of Art, Oysters and Brew. Mayor Cross provided information on the 2023 ballot measure for voters regarding a bond to replace Ammons water tank and begin upgrades to the public safety building along Highway Business Loop 20. YES, WE CAN BURN

Please be sure to follow the rules and scan below for your burn permit:

Toledo.

Registration means that burning piles of CLEAN yard debris only is now approved for the remainder of this burning season.

- Burn piles must be clean natural vegetation and cannot be any larger than 4'x4'x4'
- No trash, treated lumber products or other materials may be burned
- Fires must be at least ten (10) feet away from any other structures, fences, or other flammable materials



- Area surrounding the fire must be clean, with trimmed grass and free from shrubs
- A shovel or hand tool must be in close proximity
- A water source must be readily available and near the pile. A hose is preferred, however, 10 gallons of water or a fire extinguisher will suffice
- Approved burn barrels with a screen on top to prevent burning embers may be used
- Fire must be attended at all times
- Fire must be extinguished by sunset

Fires that produce large amounts of smoke or nauseous smells which travel towards


