This month, Toledo says "farewell" to retiring City Manager Judy Richter and "welcome" to City Manager Doug Wiggins. Doug comes to us from northeastern Oregon, where he has been the Union city administrator for almost six years. Prior to that, he served Wheatland WY as city administrator for just over two

Doug brings some great project management experience to Toledo, having worked to obtain a \$2.2 million grant from the Federal Community Development Block Grant Program to cover the cost of installing a back-up power generator system for Union. He also helped negotiate a contract with the Union County Sheriff to get a deputy serving Union part of each month, and a second Block Grant to fund the deputy position.

City Manager Judy Richter has kindly stayed on until Doug could finish up his annual audit in Union, and will work her last day as CM on August 31. However, she has also agreed to serve the city in the temporary capacity of Financial Director, while they go through the process of finding a new director. She will also be available to Doug for questions about ongoing projects.

Drought in Lincoln County: How You Can Help

Lincoln County declared a drought emergency on August 2, 2023, due to low streamflows, high temperatures, and decreased precipitation affecting businesses, residents, and the environment. During drought, water supplies for humans, fish, and wildlife are especially strained—making water conservation more important than ever. Let's work together to reduce the pressure on our water resources. Here are some water-saving ideas:

CHECK FOR LEAKS

Leaks are one of the biggest water wasters. Inspect your indoor and outdoor water fixtures for leaks—including irrigation systems—and fix any that you find. Another way to check for leaks is to read your water meter before leaving the house when no water fixtures are in use. If your water meter number is different when you return, you have a leak.

USE WATER EFFICIENTLY

The way you use your water makes a big difference:

Water your garden early in the morning to prevent water waste. Only water when your lawn absolutely needs it.

Use water-saving irrigation tools, i.e., a weather-based irrigation controller, soil moisture sensor, drip irrigation.

Install water-efficient showerheads and faucet aerators on your sinks. Stop by City Hall for a FREE faucet aerator! Reduce your shower time to save even more water.

Upgrade your toilets to more efficient models that use 1.28 gallons per flush or less.

What's happening at Arcadia Park?

There sure has been lots of digging going on! Our Public Works Department has been preparing the location for the new public restrooms that will support the park and the Skate Park across the street. The project is funded in part by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds the City received post-pandemic.

Through a grant from the State of Oregon, the rusty, worn-out metal fencing will be replaced and new lighting will be installed, as well as ADA-accessible ramps and gates. Although we are having problems locating someone to do the work, the plan includes resurfacing the tennis courts.
